


## JESSE COOLING



Jesse Cooling was born on 11<sup>th</sup> November 1893 in Bardney, Lincolnshire. His father John was a farm foreman. In 1901 the family were living in Rushton, Northamptonshire.

By 1911 Jesse had found work as a domestic Groom for a Dr Walls at The Mount, Burgh le Marsh.

On 12<sup>th</sup> April 1912 Jesse left Liverpool for Canada, sailing with the Allan Line Steamship Company on the Victorian, arriving at the port of Halifax on 20<sup>th</sup> April 1912. He appears to have sailed on his own, aged 18. Jesse was heading for Toronto, leaving his life in England as a farm labourer.

Jesse enlisted with the 1st Battalion Edmonton Fusiliers on 23<sup>rd</sup> September 1914 at Valcartier in Canada. CFB Valcartier was originally erected as a military training camp in August 1914 as part of the mobilization of the Canadian Expeditionary Force at the onset of World War I. The name Valcartier comes from the town of St. Gabriel de Valcartier, of which a large section was expropriated in order to create the military training camp. Due to its proximity to the port of Quebec, Valcartier became the largest military camp on Canadian soil, including some 32,000 men and 8,000 horses.

At the time of his enlistment, his father John was living in Dalby. Jesse was working as a strapper at the time of enlistment. A strapper worked on wooden ships tying the frames of a vessel together by the application of steel or iron straps diagonally across the frames. These straps were set in, so that the face of the strap came flush with the face of the frame. The strapper was usually a rough carpenter who could use the axe, broadaxe, adze and hatchet and understood bolting; with experience as a ship carpenter and able to use the adze in overhead work; also, familiar with the use of pneumatic drills and hammers. These tools were used extensively in this work.

Jesse was 23 years and 11 months old when he enlisted. He stood 5'5½ " tall with a 37" chest when fully expanded. He was of dark complexion with hazel eyes and black hair. He had a small mole in front of and behind his left shoulder. His regimental Number was 19381.

The Edmonton Fusiliers joined the Battle of the Somme on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1916. Jesse Cooling was killed on 9<sup>th</sup> July 1916. The War Diary reads as follows:

Situation fairly quiet on our front by 12.35am, by 12.55 dead quiet on whole front. Subsequently there was intermittent shelling on both sides but little damage to our trenches.</p>	<p>Pen</p>

Enemy's guns ranged on our positions, our field guns and heavies retaliated, intense bombardment of our whole area, commenced and continued till 10.00pm, heavy trench mortars freely used by enemy. Between 9.00pm and 10.00pm enemy fire was lifted on to our support lines, many shells landing around Battalion Headquarters. Our trenches were severely damaged. Trench mortars and one Machine gun buried, several dugouts buried, and about 100 men killed or wounded. The retaliation of our guns was slow, but insistent, from 9.00pm fire seemed about equal, from 9.30pm our superiority was established. The enemy apparently suffered as much as we did. During evening German balloons were up at six positions overlooking our area.</p>	<p>Pen</p>

Jesse Cooling is buried at the Hoge Crater Cemetery in Belgium.



He is recorded on Page 70 of the Canadian First World War Book of Remembrance. A memorial to him stands in Partney Cemetery. His father John Thomas Cooling died 24<sup>th</sup> March 1930, aged 63. His mother Mary Ann died on 21<sup>st</sup> November 1958, aged 90. Both lie in Partney Cemetery.

His brother George Henry also served in the First World War.
